
This Month's Lesson:

The Importance of History



Let's Explore

Stories about history are important because they hold truths, teach us lessons, inspire us to greatness, and help us learn from what happened.

Questions to Ask!

- What stories about America's past do you know?
 Have you heard about leaders who helped start our country?
 Have you heard about why we celebrate Thanksgiving?
- What lessons did you learn from those stories that you know?



Stories of America Collage

Have kids create a picture collage of the stories of America by cutting out pictures from old magazines, or instead, have the kids create a picture collage that represents themselves and stories from their life.



Suggestions for Older Kids or Youth: Choose 5-10 stories/events from American history and create a map that shows the location of each story/event. (Some revolutionary war events mapped here at https://mrnussbaum.com/battles-of-therevolutionary-war-interactive-map)

Family History Stories



Let's Explore

"The best loved stories are not from books or films but those from our own families"

Questions to Ask!

- Why are family stories important?
 - What is your favorite family story?
- Imagine you are a mom or dad; what family story do you think you will tell your children?





Create a Family Storybook

During a meal or another family setting, have each family member take turns talking about some of their favorite memories of spending time together or important family events. Use the stories to create a family storybook. The storybook can have a section for each family member including when and where they were born and what American events were happening during that time. *Optional*: add pictures.

Suggestions for Older Kids or Youth: Ask your relatives to tell you stories about what it was like when they were growing up in America and important events in their lives. Create a family history timeline.

Week 4: Lesson

Treasuring Our American Stories



Elbridge S. Brooks, author of *True Stories of Christopher Columbus* (published 1892), ends his book with a powerful message, "Happier than any fairytale, more marvelous than any wonder book, the story of the United States of America begins 'Once upon a time' and has come to the point where it depends upon the boys and girls who read it to say whether or not they shall 'live happily ever after."

The author is expressing that once we have learned the American stories, we have the power to decide what happens in the stories of our own lives. The progress of our nation depends on how boys and girls make decisions today and for the future.

Questions to Ask!

- Every day when we make choices, it becomes part of our history. What good choices could you make to create positive moments in history?
- If you were president, and you had 3 important decisions to make for the nation, what would you do to help make a positive impact for the people of the nation?


