Questions to Ask!

- 1 Why is it important to be polite?
 - How do you show good manners to everyone?



Keep a jar for a week or a month and put in a marble (or other item) each time a child shows politeness or good manners.

Choose a fun family activity or outing to reward the family when they fill the jar or reach a certain point.



Suggestions for Older Kids or Youth: Prepare a meal of your choice for your family and teach meal etiquette. Then, make a funny skit with your family members about meal etiquette.

A Family's Mission



Let's Explore

Mission: A special assignment given to a person or group.

"A family mission statement can be as simple as a sentence stating who you want to be as a family. For example, "As part of the Smith family, we love and respect ourselves and each other." Or, it could be the condensed version of lots of brainstorming and working together as a family to refine your objectives and family goals. In either case, it's a great way to simplify some of your family's values." — Laura Kraus



Questions to Ask!

- Why is it important for a family to have goals and missions?
 - How does achieving goals and accomplishing missions benefit your community?



Meet as a family to create a Family Mission Statement.

What is your mission?

What is important to you? To Your Family?

Get everyone involved in the discussion.

You can also create a family slogan and logo.

What is our mission?

Suggestions for Older Kids or Youth: Go stargazing as a family and ask family members to share what "reaching for the stars" means to them and what their dreams are. Create a vision board with their answers and hang it up for the whole family to see. Optional: add pictures.


